Seeing through Stone


IAS, Santa Cruz Barrios Unidos, San José Musem of Art APRIL 12, 2024—JANUARY 5, 2025



- The Future Exhibitions Fund helped support multiple new commissions from artists inside and outside of prisons for Seeing through Stone.



EDUCATION PROGRAMS

The IAS serves as a laboratory and a classroom, providing students and our communities opportunities to learn and create new ways of meeting the broad challenges of the rapidly changing world.

Highlights

- The third annual Visualizing Abolition dissertation workshop inspired graduate student research.
- The new IAS Art for All program provided 10 high school students from across Santa Cruz County exciting paid opportunities to learn about art and museum careers.
- Paid undergraduate internships offered students hands-on, once-in-a lifetime art experiences.
- The first cohort of the Visualizing Abolition Studies (VAST) Undergraduate Certificate Program graduated.

INITIATIVES

The IAS collaborates with artists, researchers, and faculty through major multidisciplinary initiatives. These public scholarship programs creatively engage audiences on critical social and environmental issues.

An Aesthetics of Resilience

A new art and science initiative at the IAS, organized in collaboration with Professor Ari Friedlaender, Ocean Sciences, launched in Fall 2023. With funding from the University of California Office of the President (UCOP), scientists at the Friedlaender Lab are working with artists to address climate change and its effects on the California Coast for an exhibition opening in May 2025.
